News from the Field

Arizona: **Zander Evans** (<u>zander@forestguild.org</u>) recently <u>spoke with radio station</u> KJZZ about the **2019 wildfire season**, and **what to expect in 2020**. He got in some **good messages** about the benefits that fire—at the right time, in the right place—can provide.

California: Congratulations to **Frank Lake** on receiving a **Distinguished Science Award**, one of five Pacific Southwest Research Station Director's 2019 Honor Awards. His leadership within the **Western Klamath Restoration Partnership** is highlighted in a January 3 Forest Service blog post about the honor.

Frank Lake is also one of the people interviewed on **The Takeaway podcast** episode "How Tribal Members Are Shaping the Federal Government's Wildfire Strategy," along with **Chook-Chook Hillman**, a project leader for Eco-Cultural Revitalization and Stewardship in the Karuk Tribe's DNR.

Oregon: The cross-boundary Coyote Creek Prescribed Burn conducted by The Nature Conservancy and Forest Service in October was featured in the Pacific Northwest Fire and Aviation Management summary of the 2019 Wildland Fire Season. For more about the burn, contact Craig Bienz (cbienz@tnc.org).

Funding: Community Resilience / Wildfire Community Preparedness Day / Lessons Learned

Community Resilience: The National Fish and Wildlife Foundation Resilient Communities
Program is "designed to prepare for future environmental challenges by enhancing community
capacity to plan and implement resiliency projects and improve the protections afforded by natural
ecosystems by investing in green infrastructure and other measures." Focus areas include forest health
and water quality and quantity, and there is an emphasis on community inclusion and underserved
populations. See the NFWF website for details, including a link to the recording of an applicant webinar.
Pre-proposals are due by February 18.

Wildfire Community Preparedness Day: On a smaller scale, the annual Wildfire Community Preparedness Day—Saturday, May 2 this year—gives people a chance to plan and participate in risk reduction or wildfire preparedness activities to make their communities safer. With support from State Farm, NFPA will provide \$500 awards to 150 applicants for their projects. Details are at www.wildfireprepday.org; apply by February 28.

Resources: Storytelling / Motivations / Goals / PODs

Storytelling: A recording of the webinar "Better Stories, Bigger Impact: How Scientists Can Engage Effectively with the Media to Share Their Science," from the Northwest Climate Adaptation Science Center's skills-building webinar series, is now available. Science reporter Julia Rosen gives a good introduction about how media works—including a general outline of the differences between media like newspapers, magazines and web-based publications; guidance and insights into what makes a good story; and how to work with reporters for best results.

Motivations: A <u>brief piece</u> in the *Free-range Thinking* newsletter from the <u>Goodman Center</u> asks "**Fear or Hope: Which Motivates More?**" The group Climate Resolve recently used a **dual approach**, featuring alternate outcomes, in a successful fundraising and awareness campaign.

Goals: With a new calendar in hand, January can be a good time to set (or review) goals for the year. If "Where do I start?" has crossed your mind, the FAC Net <u>blog post</u> by **Michelle Medley-Daniel** "Setting Goals for 2020: **A Month-by-Month Approach**" is a good place to start for community-based work—and even if your calendar is full, there are some good reminders.

PODs: The report "Collaboratively Engaging Stakeholders to Develop Potential Operational Delineations" from the Colorado Forest Restoration Institute gives a good introduction to this new wildfire management planning tool, including a section on frequently asked questions and lessons learned. "PODs are a strategic planning tool developed using a combination of local expertise and advanced spatial analysis. They identify the safest and most effective control lines used to contain a wildfire and can assist in integrating land management objectives and incident response." Articles & Reports: Wildfire Recovery / Restoring Ecosystem Services / Tree Regeneration

Wildfire Recovery: The authors of the <u>article</u> "Wildfire Recovery as a 'Hot Moment' for Creating Fire-Adapted Communities" suggest that the period following a destructive wildfire may provide an opportunity for the "widespread and decentralized action" needed for transformation.

Restoring Ecosystem Services: The <u>report</u> "Restoring Ecosystem Services Tool (REST): A Program for Selecting Species for Restoration Projects Using a **Functional-Trait Approach**" describes a **computer program** that helps users **select alternative plant species** to restore ecosystem function when restoration to pre-existing conditions may not be possible.

Tree Regeneration: The <u>final report</u> from the JFSP project "**Post-Fire Tree Regeneration** and Fuels Across the Northern Rockies Following Large Wildfires: Science Meta-Analyses, Scenarios and Manager Workshops" is now available. Assessing tree regeneration over a 30-year period, the authors found **reduced regeneration in the 21**st **century**. The management implications highlight the importance of using wildfires and prescribed fires to **enhance forest heterogeneity** and reduce the likelihood of large high-severity patches.
