#### News from the Field

**California**: **Bill Tripp** and **Margo Robbins** and their approaches and experiences as members of the **Karuk** and **Yurok** tribes, respectively, are highlighted in the *New York Times* <u>article</u> "Native Solutions to Big Fires: **Cultural burning practices** are working to reduce wildfires in northern Australia. Can they work in California, too?"

California: The California State Association of Counties—which last year awarded the Humboldt County Prescribed Burn Association one of its Challenge Awards—has produced a <u>video</u> highlighting the work of the PBA, the first in the West. New Jersey: Last year, Bill Brash (Bill@NJFireSafetyCouncil.org) attended a meeting of the Georgia Prescribed Fire Council with FAC Net colleague Frank Riley, and was inspired by the close relationship between the council and the NRCS there. This inspiration from Georgia, combined with the increased prescribed burn opportunities on private lands available through New Jersey's recent prescribed burn legislation, was the catalyst for a project put in action last month. The New Jersey Forest Fire Service and New Jersey Fire Safety Council hosted a prescribed burning workshop for NRCS staff (and others), to begin to build capacity for private lands burning in the state. In New Jersey\*, NRCS can provide financial assistance for the preparation of burn plans and the implementation of fire breaks, fuel breaks, pre-burn mechanical thinning and even the burn itself on private lands. This workshop covered most of the 16-hour training requirement needed for staff to review burn plans. Demand was strong—instead of the 35 or 40 participants expected, 90 people signed up, including NRCS staff from New York and Pennsylvania. "We are gearing up to increase prescribed burn acreage in New Jersey on both private lands and non-traditional public lands and NRCS and their resources were a good place to start that effort," according to Bill.

New Mexico: The Rural Voices for Conservation Coalition just published "Working Together to Increase the Pace and Scale of Prescribed Fire," a <u>case study</u> focused on the Forest Stewards Guild's All Hands All Lands Burn Team. It briefly highlights how "partners used a variety of mechanisms to align organizational goals, build trust across agencies and organizations, and combine resources and skills, which ultimately resulted in the trained personnel needed to work across all lands in New Mexico." In less than a year, the AHAL Burn Team burned 6,236 acres across the **Rio Grande Water Fund**.

**Virginia**: More than **80 FLN partners** gathered in Virginia last week for the **Burning Big! workshop** to explore **large burn implementation** in the Central Appalachians. Over two days, participants attended seven small group interactive skill building sessions, networking exercises, presentations and a panel discussion that covered both the operational and partnership-building aspects of how to continue to scale up restoration in the Appalachians. ## Funding: Catalyst Fund

Catalyst Fund: The Landscape Conservation Catalyst Fund will distribute approximately \$335,000 in funding this year through competitive grants to landscape conservation partnerships that are poised for catalytic growth as they move from collective vision to collective action. A portion of the Catalyst Fund is reserved specifically for Indigenous-led partnerships working to advance Indigenous landscape conservation priorities. ## Resources: Scaling Up / Smoke Outreach / Communications / Be Safe

**Scaling Up**: If you've ever thought about what it means to "scale up" solutions, ignore the geeky title and check out the <u>blog post</u> "Problematizing Scale in the Social Sector: **Expanding Conceptions**." Bottom line: there are **many ways to scale**, and one size does not fit all.

Smoke Outreach: A recent FAC Net <u>blog post</u> about the Forest Stewards Guild's HEPA filter loan program notes that "an unexpected success of the program is that it opened new channels of communication between the public and fire managers. The program provides an alternative way for people to voice their concerns about smoke while offering a partial solution. Every time we answer the phone to loan out a filter, we have an opportunity to talk about how we plan and implement prescribed fire and the ecological benefits of fire on the landscape."

**Communications**: While the <u>article</u> "Entering Climate Change Communications **Through the Side Door**" from the *Stanford Social Innovation Review* is focused on climate change, the recommendations it lays out are probably applicable to other **polarizing issues** as well.

Be Safe: The Wildland Fire Lessons Learned Center has a <u>quick summary</u> of numbers collected from 2019 incident reports (including a couple surprising ones).

## Articles & Reports: Restoration Economy / Forest Workforce / Biomass

Restoration Economy: The study "Economic Effects of Wildfire Risk Reduction and Source Water Protection Projects in the Rio Grande River Basin in Northern New Mexico and Southern Colorado" was recently published by the USGS in collaboration with The Nature Conservancy. The authors found that in 2018, the Rio Grande Water Fund (RGWF) created 22 full-time equivalent jobs in New Mexico and surrounding western states while adding nearly \$2 million to the local economy. These jobs are a direct result of the increased investment in forest restoration, supported by the RGWF and its funders. The RGWF is a multi-stakeholder collaborative effort to increase the scale of forest restoration to reduce wildfire risk and secure water for one million people in the state. Forest Workforce: The report "Fostering Your Forest Workforce: A Peer Learning Exchange for Nonprofit Organizations" shares highlights from an event last November hosted by the Rural Voices for Conservation Coalition, Ecosystem Workforce Program and Lomakatsi Restoration Project. (The RVCC website also has a summary from a shared stewardship workshop and a six-state summary crosswalk of shared stewardship agreements.)

**Biomass**: The lack of markets for low-value woody biomass can be a barrier to accelerating the pace and scale of restoration treatments. A **pilot project** in Flagstaff tested the possibilities of **shipping wood chips long distances** to foreign markets. Highlights of the results (and a link to the full technical report) are in Ecological Restoration Institute <u>fact sheet</u> "Chip & Ship: Testing the Logistics of Supplying Wood Chips Over Long Distances Using Intermodal Railroad Transportation."
