Impacts of Climate Change are Unequal



SEAFARE GOALS

Phase I and II: Identify barriers to accessing coastal climate adaptation funding and ways to remove those barriers to promote equitable and just access to adaptation resources

Phase II: Develop a toolkit with Advisory Committee members, aimed at policy makers and funding program managers, with recommendations to improve funding systems

Phase III: Implement guidance through collaborative work with government and funding agencies in Maryland

All Phases: Foster relationships and knowledge exchange among Advisory Committee members to advance climate adaptation goals

FUNDING SYSTEM



WHAT HAPPENS AT EACH STEP



BARRIERS EXIST ACROSS ALL LEVELS



LEGISLATION

Stipulates the intended funding use and provides key definitions and criteria that are incorporated into solicitations

Historically, legislation has not recognized the needs of environmental justice communities. These communities are often not clearly defined in legislation

FUNDING PROGRAMS

Establish program priorities and provide availability of technical support

Environmental focus in state agency programs outweighs focus on communities' needs, often caused by low representation from frontline communities

SOLICITATIONS

Establish and weigh the criteria used to determine funding allocation

Criteria weighing does not meaningfully reflect community needs. Environmental focus in funding initiatives outweighs focus on community needs

PROPOSAL REVIEW

Reviewer representation and criteria interpretation drive proposal selection

Well resourced communities are better positioned for new funding as they are more likely to meet the solicitation criteria

PROJECT IMPLEMENTATION

Project outcomes reflect the priorities outlined by the funding system

Environmental justice communities struggle to launch pilot projects and create expertise within their own communities

Barriers to Funding

Initial buckets – identified during Phase 1

- Built in Inequities
- Inconsistent terminology
- Dependence on maladapted legislation and/or capital budgets

Ongoing discussions – what we're diving into – Phase 2

- Local and State bureaucratic process – Baltimore City Example
- Siloed grantmaking within agencies – NOAA and IRA Example
- EJ tools with lacking information (CEJST)
- Inadequate tracking of Justice 40 “Benefits” (related to above)
- Quasi Government Grantmaking (Foundations receiving federal money for grants)
- Review Process (panel make-up, timelines, capacity at agencies)
