News from the Field

California: Over the last few years, the **Golden Bear neighborhood** in South Lake Tahoe partnered with the **Tahoe RCD Fire Adapted Communities Program** to **prepare for wildfire**. When the **evacuation order** came as the Caldor Fire swept closer, in spite of the neighborhood having only one egress, “Everyone calmly got their things together and we didn’t face any traffic at all,” according to one resident. New Mexico: The Forest Stewards Guild and The Nature Conservancy—partners in **The Greater Santa Fe Fireshed Coalition**—have added a [new page](#) to the coalition’s website. “**One Watershed, One Forest**” talks about source water, watersheds and their relation to wildfire. New Mexico: An [article](#) by **Anne Bradley** (abradley@tnc.org), “**Creating Resilient Forests** in the Jemez Mountains” is featured on US Nature 4Climate. The article, which highlights the work of the **Rio Grande Water Fund**, and the All Hands All Lands burning program that supports it, note that “reducing the risk of damaging wildfires—and planting in areas where natural tree regeneration is unlikely—are forest strategies that together help **maintain and increase carbon storage** on the landscape.”

South Carolina: South Carolina State Parks, South Carolina Forestry Commission and TNC met earlier this month at Table Rock State Park to discuss the **future of fire management** at SC State Parks and develop a **SCSP Mountains Fire Management Plan** for the next 10 years; they also discussed burn plan development for several parks. Virginia: The **Allegheny Highlands FLN** landscape and **TREX** are highlighted in the [article](#) “**Fire, Management and Monitoring**” on the Conservancy’s nature.org website. For more about this landscape, contact **Laurel Schablein** (lschablein@tnc.org).

Washington: The **Cascadia TREX** kicked off on Saturday with a **12-acre burn** in the **Roslyn Urban Forest**. The Roslyn Fire Department, Kittitas County Fire District 1, Kittitas County Fire Protection District 6, Cle Elum VFD, Kittitas County Fire District 7, Kittitas Valley Fire & Rescue, Snoqualmie Pass Fire & Rescue, Yakima Training Center, Lincoln County Fire District 1, Gig Harbor Fire and Medic One, Central Mason Fire and Rescue, Washington DNR and The Nature Conservancy worked together to accomplish this burn. Rain is in the forecast this week, but organizers are hoping to burn again around the weekend.

Nominations: IAWF

IAWF: The **International Association of Wildland Fire** is [accepting nominations](#) in four categories; nominations are due by December 2.

Resources: Rx Communications / Public Opinion / Policy / Fuel Loading

Rx Communications: The **Great Plains Fire Science Exchange** has produced a prescribed burning [communications kit](#) that focuses on **rangeland burning**, with detailed resources for Oklahoma and Texas burners.

Public Opinion: Voters in **eight western states** were polled on **conservation issues** early this year. The results—summarized by state or by topic—are available on the Colorado College State of the Rockies Project [website](#). Wildfire, climate change and water are among the topics explored.

Policy: **FAC Net** recently hosted a six-month learning group focused on conversations about wildfire policy and governance. Some of their **lessons learned and links to resources** are collected in the [blog post](#) “All About Policy: Lessons from the Policy Learning Group.”

Fuel Loading: The [most recent issue](#) of *Science You Can Use*, “**Simple, Fast, and Cheap: A New Photoload Sequence Building Technique for Fuel Load Estimates**,” briefly introduces, and links to, an October 2020 general technical report that walks users through a “quick and accurate means of **estimating the volume of wildland fuels** on the landscape including 1-hour, 10-hour, 100-hour, and 1,000-hour downed dead woody, shrub, and herbaceous fuels.”

Articles & Reports: Good Neighbor Authority / Ten Questions / Indigenous Burning

Good Neighbor Authority: The **Rural Voices for Conservation Coalition** recently published the [report](#) “Use of Good Neighbor Authority Across the West.” It reviews “the **current scope and status** of GNA use on Forest Service-managed lands in 12 Western states, noting both **region-wide trends** as well as important **differences between states**.”

Ten Questions: A new [fact sheet](#) from the Ecological Restoration Institute summarizes the journal article “**Adapting Western North American Forests** to Climate Change and Wildfires: Ten Common Questions.”

Indigenous Burning: In the [article](#) “The Importance of Indigenous Cultural Burning in Forested Regions of the **Pacific West, USA**,” the authors “**synthesized literature regarding objectives and effects** of cultural burning in this region within an ecosystem services framework.” Among other findings, they note that much of the research is narrowly focused, looking at single burns over short timeframes in limited contexts; complex interactions and scale considerations have made the full range of effects difficult to evaluate.

Fire Severity: The [article](#) “**Drivers of Fire Severity Shift** as Landscapes Transition to an Active Fire Regime, **Klamath Mountains, USA**” was recently published in *Ecosphere*. The authors found that “fire weather and fuels were dominant controls in non-reburns, while previous burn severity, fuel characteristics, and time since last fire were drivers for reburns.” For an overview of the article, see the [ScienceDaily story](#) about it.

In the News: California Legislation / New MOU / Pyroaerobiology

California Legislation: The California state legislature has passed **two important wildfire-related bills**. Assembly Bill 642 enhances wildland fire prevention efforts, including by **facilitating cultural burning practices**. Senate Bill 332 eases restrictions on prescribed burning by applying a **gross negligence standard** on burn bosses; it also creates a \$20 million pilot prescribed fire claims fund. AB642 was signed into law yesterday; SB332 is awaiting Governor Newsom’s signature.

New MOU: The **Department of the Interior** and the **Intertribal Timber Council** [announced](#) a new agreement to work together in wildland fire management, as 6.5 million acres of land managed by the DOI are within 50 miles of tribal land. The organizations pledge to coordinate on **workforce development** efforts and facilitate the **exchange of perspectives and information**, identify **shared values**, use information technology to improve decision making among partners and highlight common conservation priorities to **combat the effects of climate change**.

Pyroaerobiology: The [article](#) "What if a Brand New Field of Science Could Explain **How Wildfire Smoke Carries Microbes?**" features the work of University of Idaho associate professor **Leda Kobziar**. Her team has found more than 1,000 different types of microbes in smoke samples.

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Doctoral Research Assistantship

"Agri-environmental Conservation Incentives in the Extreme Wildfire Context of the U.S. Southern Plains"

The Department of Geography and Geospatial Sciences at Kansas State University invites applications for a 3-year funded Doctoral Research Assistantship to support an interdisciplinary study on how wildfire risk interacts with conservation incentives in rural landscapes as part of the NSF-funded project, "Agri-environmental Conservation Incentives in the Extreme Wildfire Context of the U.S. Southern Plains." The PhD researcher will work primarily with Audrey Joslin and Marcellus Caldas, but will also engage with collaborators Jason Bergtold and Ignacio Ciampitti, all at Kansas State University.

In the U.S., many conservation programs provide financial incentives to private landowners of farms and ranches to reduce soil erosion, protect wildlife habitat, and improve watersheds. Droughts and hotter temperatures over recent years, however, have increased threats of wildfire in the grasslands of the southern Plains, and landowners may perceive conservation efforts as furthermore contributing to wildfire events. This project examines the effects of wildfire in rural landscapes and how perceived wildfire risks shape agricultural land management and landowner decisions to engage in conservation programs and practices. Studying the interactions between wildfires, rural conservation efforts, and responses of farmers and landowners provide a critical foundation for understanding how environmental changes and extreme events may influence conservation activities. Knowledge about the relationships between wildfire and conservation land management practices will help both policy-makers and landowners make informed decisions about conservation programs.

Key responsibilities & opportunities:

- Work with faculty Joslin and Caldas as well as collaborators to co-manage fieldwork in the Southern Great Plains Region.
- Train and supervise undergraduate research assistants.
- Develop peer-reviewed journal articles, academic presentations, and outreach materials.

Required qualifications:

- Master's degree (by August 15, 2022) in geography, natural resource management, or related field.
- Demonstrated social science research experience
- Interest in wildfire and rural agricultural landscapes
- Excellent verbal and written communication skills
- Commitment to interdisciplinary research

- Previous experience or coursework with GIS

Course Description: This course is designed to provide students with the knowledge and skills necessary to recognize and communicate the relationships between basic fire regimes and fire effects, the effects of fire treatments on fire effects, and to manipulate fire treatments to achieve desired fire effects (NWCG 2017).

Class length: 35 hours

Date: **Dec. 6th to 17th 2021** The content is self-paced so you can complete the material anytime in this two-week period. If those dates do not work for you, you can still sign up and be added to the list for the next offering. There is some flexibility on completing the course after the 16th if you make arrangements with the course coordinator.

Who can take the course: The course is open to anyone. This online class is also being offered in the early spring through many geographic areas so first talk to your training specialist to see if there is a geographic area offering that you can participate in.

Interested in obtaining credit? Indicate in the registration form and you will receive additional information.

Structure of the class:
