

## **Increasing Prescribed Fire Capacity:**


## **Prescribed Fire Councils**

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**CHALLENGE** California accomplishes relatively little prescribed fire even though 54 percent of the state's ecosystems are fire-dependent, and almost the rest are fire-adapted. Practitioners have worked in isolated bubbles, accomplishing burning on their own landscapes, but until recently had no forum for working on shared challenges, celebrating successes, or expanding their impact.

**SOLUTION** A professor at Humboldt State University made a pitch for prescribed fire councils, which at the time were common in the Southeast, but had not yet taken hold in the West. A small team decided to move the idea forward, and the Northern California Prescribed Fire Council (www.norcalrxfirecouncil.org/) was formed.



**WHY IT WORKS** By providing a venue for collaboration, shared learning, science delivery and networking, the council has set the stage for a whole host of efforts, including training, policy, private lands burning, and more. Annual meetings of the council are like family reunions, and the sense of camaraderie and trust that the council has built will continue to advance collaboration and culture change around prescribed fire.
